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LETTER FROM LEADERSHIP HEALTH FOUNDATION OF SOUTH FLORIDA LEADERS

Reflecting on the past year, we are proud of our collective achievements in fostering a more thriving South Florida. In 2024, the Health Foundation of South Florida, through the South Florida Anchor Alliance (SFAA), had over \$3 million in active grants and program support, reaching close to 2,000 local and small businesses and providing more than 200 students with scholarships for health care related anchor jobs.

The South Florida Anchor Alliance (SFAA), an initiative of the Health Foundation of South Florida, is a collaborative of 20 regional institutions, including healthcare systems, education enterprises, and municipalities that joined forces in 2019 to create a more robust South Florida economy through collective local procurement and workforce development initiatives. SFAA is a key pillar to advancing the Health Foundation's strategy to increasing economic well-being, and we remain steadfast in our commitment to furthering the collective vision that was set back then by all partners.

Key Highlights:

- SFAA Regional Marketplace Launch: In 2024, we continued and concluded the implementation of the SFAA Regional Marketplace pilot project, a free online platform connecting local and small businesses with procurement opportunities from our Anchor Members. This initiative aims to streamline the procurement process and bolster local businesses. Our collaborative efforts have led to increased regional efforts to enhance local vendor engagement and targeted capacity building. These initiatives are designed to build a thriving local business community and increase contracting opportunities.
- Workforce Development Initiatives: We have continued our partnerships with three of the Anchor institutions, Miami Dade College, Broward College, and Florida Memorial University, which are focused on building a local hiring pipeline by preparing residents for high-demand jobs, creating career pathways, and linking them to job opportunities across Anchor institutions.

Looking forward to 2025, we are excited to continue to work with our Anchor partners, in advancing a number of strategic priorities for the SFAA.

- Drafting the next version of our Blueprint for Action. The first iteration, developed in 2019, will be improved by our lessons learned and through collaborative dialogue with Anchor members.
- Implementation of a new Governance Model. Informed by Anchor members, the SFAA will be moving forward with the adoption of a shared governance model, clear roles and responsibilities, and formalize its shared decision making process.
- Selecting the next technology platform for the SFAA **Regional Marketplace.** We are evaluating new technology providers to improve the user experience of the Anchors and to drive more business for the local small businesses on the platform.

We remain committed to accelerating connections between procurement opportunities and local and small businesses. At the upcoming May Strategic Planning Workshop, we look forward to sharing progress, discussing opportunities, and strategizing to further our mission. Alongside these efforts, we are focused on building a strong talent pipeline to ensure the region's workforce is prepared to meet the evolving job demands of the anchors.

Thank you for your continued support and dedication to our shared mission. Together, we are making a lasting impact on our community.






SOUTH FLORIDA ANCHOR ALLIANCE REGIONAL MARKETPLACE

The SFAA Regional Marketplace is pursuing several strategies to achieve the goal of building capabilities amongst small businesses and creating connections to advance local purchasing. In May 2023, the South Florida Anchor Alliance officially launched the Regional Marketplace, aimed at helping local small businesses access contracting opportunities at regional anchor institutions. The Pilot Program is a first-of-its-kind digital platform and was designed to make the process of finding opportunities and bidding on contracts to do business with large institutions easier and more accessible.

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LOCAL PROCUREMENT



SFAA REGIONAL MARKETPLACE UPDATE

As the SFAA Regional Marketplace moves beyond its pilot phase, the focus shifts to developing a long-term technology strategy that supports continued growth, sustainability, and impact. To shape the future of the Regional Marketplace, all Anchor institutions involved in the pilot identified key areas for improvement to enhance the potential impact of a fully operational Regional Marketplace that emphasized continued collaboration across Anchor members.

Beyond ensuring the technology platform can be scaled and sustained, Anchors expressed the need for increased vendor engagement and improved data sharing and standardization. Building on key successes from the pilot—such as strengthened collaboration among anchor institutions, expanded opportunities for local and small businesses, centralized procurement data, and the creation of a nationally replicable model— SFAA is advancing a unified vision for the Regional Marketplace that continues to drive meaningful economic outcomes across South Florida.

To capture all these findings, Anchor members gathered in June to outline a Playbook to share lessons learned, best practices, and strategies to inform activities after the pilot project period.

CAPACITY-BUILDING PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Local small businesses assisted by the Capacity-Building Program are making significant strides in preparing to bid on opportunities and expanding their networks.

Spotlight: ShadeFLA



In Spring 2024, ShadeFLA, purveyor of custom shade structures and commercial retractable roofs, began their capacity-building journey with Prospera. The team moved to the "Ready Now" stage after completing the vendor registration process for Broward County. With an invitation facilitated by Prospera, the ShadeFLA team attended the LBAN (Latino Business Action Network) matchmaking event, which provided networking opportunities and potential business collaborations. In April, a bidding opportunity with the City of Plantation was shared with the client, broadening their scope of work and potential partnerships. Finally, the client

received assistance updating their capability statement, which is a critical tool for presenting their qualifications and services to potential clients. ShadeFLA was recognized as a Client Success Stories Honoree at Prospera's annual event in October.

Spotlight: DGSAFEWORK.COM, LLC



DGSAFEWORK.COM, LLC, a provider of services related to dangerous goods, was invited to attend the MDC Procurement seminar to assist with their bidding research process, helping them better understand procurement opportunities and procedures. Following a review of their business, the capacity-building team determined that DGASAFEWORK.COM, LLC, was "Ready Now", indicating they met all necessary requirements and were prepared to enter the bidding process. The capacity-building team made key referrals (1) to a banking partner to explore obtaining a business credit line for working capital, which is essential

for supporting their operations and expanding their capacity to handle more projects, and (2) to Miami Dade County to develop business relationships and gather more information about future bidding opportunities, further expanding their network and potential client base. DGSAFEWORK.COM, LLC, has been actively progressing through procurement seminars and building key financial and governmental relationships.

MAYOR DANIELLA LEVINE CAVA LAUNCHES WORKFORCE.MIAMI



The Health Foundation of South Florida was honored to celebrate the launch of the Workforce Miami platform at the Miami Dade College IDEA Center. Workforce. Miami is a partnership between Miami Dade County Mayor Daniella Levine Cava and her team at the Office of Innovation & Economic Development and the South Florida Anchor Alliance. The platform is a one-stop shop for the future workforce to find job opportunities, upskilling programs, internships, and vital resources to foster economic stability, especially for those in the ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) population. Through this partnership with Miami Dade County, the South Florida Anchor Alliance is building on the strengths of our collective efforts to close the opportunity gap while strengthening the workforce of our anchor institutions. Together, we are laying the foundation for a future-focused workforce ecosystem and helping to address economic and opportunity barriers that must be mitigated to advance health equity in our community. We are grateful to the County for hosting and powering this important tool

to empower local residents and enhance our workforce. We look forward to watching it grow and seeing its positive impact on our community.

INVESTMENTS IN WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT AT BROWARD COLLEGE AND MIAMI DADE COLLEGE

The SFAA Workforce Development initiative is pursuing several strategies to achieve the goal of increasing the workforce pipeline for anchor institutions and overcoming barriers to employment. Two investments at Broward College and Miami Dade College demonstrate this commitment to workforce development, specifically focused on addressing shortages in nursing and allied health professionals.

"Enhancing Health Science Student Success" at Broward College

Designed to address the nursing and allied health workforce crisis in South Florida, a multifaceted student success initiative was created to enhance retention and completion rates at Broward College. As part of this effort, 50 scholarships have been awarded to students enrolled in degree programs in the nursing and allied health programs.

"MDC Nursing Growth Plan" at Miami Dade College

The investment supports students with economic needs entering the nursing career pathway and pursuing a LPN, an associate or bachelor's degree at Miami Dade College. Scholarships providing tuition assistance and textbook support have been provided to 35 students living at or below the poverty level in Miami Dade County. Beyond tuition and books, the program funded tutors to prepare students for certification exams, student boot camps, and faculty development.









PLACE-BASED INVESTING AND ACCESS TO CAPITAL RESOURCES

SFAA hosted two information sessions on the topics of Place-Based Investing and Access to Capital. In August, we introduced Place-Based Investing as a pillar of the South Florida Anchor Alliance (SFAA) Blueprint for Action. We invited The Healthcare Anchor Network (HAN), a growing national collaboration of 70+ leading healthcare systems working to build more inclusive and sustainable local economies, to provide an introductory presentation on Place-Based Investing, with Trinity Health sharing their journey.

Then, in September, the Access to Capital Webinar was an insightful session featuring SFAA members from Broward County and The City of Miami, along with presenters from the Urban League of Broward County, Allapattah Collaborative CDC, and Broward College. The program covered essential topics such as capital sources for businesses in South Florida, readiness criteria for accessing capital, and practical guidance for preparing for funding and procurement opportunities.
